This short bit of Ordinary Time gives us all a chance at least to catch our breath before the more intense season of Lent/Easter is upon us. Perhaps this is the time for ministers to take some time for themselves and the Lord. (Be sure to read Rick Modlin's article on pages 18–21 about using substitute musicians.) Is it time for a vacation or perhaps a retreat? How about the routine physical exam? The excuse of being busy has caused a lot of pain, literally, when it comes to health issues. Some claim to be too busy to take care of routine check-ups because of busy-ness at church. Living in the world of the spiritual, we sometimes neglect the physical. But as we get older, our bodies need attention. In *An Altar in the World: A Geography of Faith* (New York: HarperOne, 2009), Barbara Brown Taylor writes, "Where Christians are concerned, this leaves us in the peculiar position of being followers of the Word-Made-Flesh who neglect our own flesh or—worse—who treat our bodies with shame and scorn" (p. 41). Reverend Taylor doesn't pull punches! The reflections of her life in ministry resonate with those in pastoral ministry.

Many communities celebrated infant baptism, fittingly, on the feast of the Baptism of the Lord. Soon the celebration of baptism at the Easter Vigil will be upon us. Now would be an appropriate time for the liturgy team to review the *Rite of Baptism*. Staff changes, growth, and change of professional ministers in a faith community can rightfully lead to a refresher on the rites of the sacrament and how this sacrament is celebrated.

### Ritual Notes

Today's first reading ("Here I am...send me!") and Gospel ("they left everything and followed him") are often cited as scriptural references for vocations in church ministry, and, in some places, today is observed as World Day for Consecrated Life. In today's prayer of the faithful, pray for those who have responded to their baptismal call to mission through vocations as priests, sisters, and brothers in religious communities. Information and resources for World Day for Consecrated Life are available from the National Coalition for Church Vocations ([nccv-vocations.org](http://nccv-vocations.org)). Publicize the "Catholics on Call" young adult conferences sponsored by the Cardinal Bernardin Center at Catholic Theological Union in Chicago ([catholicsoncall.org](http://catholicsoncall.org)). These three-to-five day conferences are for Catholics between the ages of 18 and 30 who are considering a life of service in the Church in ordained ministry, consecrated life, or lay ministry.

All three of today's readings refer, in one way or another, to evangelization. Resources for Catholic evangelization include the tenth anniversary edition of *Go and Make Disciples: A National Plan and Strategy for Catholic Evangelization in the United States* by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops and *Ministry through the Lens of Evangelization* (both from USCCB Publishing, 800-235-8722, [usccb.org](http://usccb.org)) and the Paulist National Catholic Evangelization Association ([npcea.org](http://npcea.org)).

### HEARING THE CALL

Isaiah's prophetic call is mysterious: God's smoky and glorious presence in the sanctuary, with the seraphim crying out as we do in the eucharistic prayer, "Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory." Peter, James and John were called from much more mundane circumstances: hauling in fish. We are all called from where we are: "Follow the Lord, and proclaim his risen presence." Like Paul, we are called to receive this summons and live our lives in response to it.
